Dear Stan and John,

Since now it is up to us Marvel Maniacs to answer or reply to a question or comment in the letters column, I will do my duty. Re Mr. Melvin Payton's inquiry in issue #66 as to why Spidey's webbing didn't stick to the wall when it is supposed to be waterproof: The answer is simplicity itself. First a definition of waterproof (Webster's Third New International Dictionary): quote, "Impervious to water as a.) covered or treated with a material to prevent permeation by water. b.) relating to or characterizing a machine or structure so constructed that a material of water may be directed on it under specified conditions without the water entering." Now, in issue #29 where Spider-Man comments on the fact that the webbing is waterproof he is changing cartridges—under water. So he is saying that he is lucky that it was created waterproof as the water cannot seep in and dilute the web fluid, not that he is lucky that the water won't stop it from sticking as water will prevent sticking of the web if it causes whatever the web is to be attached to become sufficiently slick. Note that in issue #29 Spider-Man did not stick the webbing to the scorpion but rather used his web as a net. Only when he dried out on the dock did the web begin to stick. So in issue #63 the webbing was not able to stick to the building because it was too slick. And all the good waterproofing did Spidey was to keep the rain from dissolving the web as it reached toward the building. So the waterproofing doesn't help the web to stick to water-slick surfaces at all. Has enough been said?
