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












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


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












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
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
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


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US GROOVIN' KEEPS

I have finally figured out how Spider-Man's web-shooter works! First of all, there are the aluminum cartridges filled with compressed web fluid. The hole which the fluid comes out of is covered with some sort of wax which can stand up to the pressure from inside. Seven of these cartridges fit around his wrist. They snap into seven sections of a type of conveyor belt in the web-shooter. The wax of the first cartridge to be used is snipped off by a sharp blade when the cartridge is snapped in. When the fluid is exhausted, Spidey manually rotates the conveyor belt until the next cartridge is in place. (Its wax sealing is snipped off too when it trotates into the cartred place.)

When the button in Spider-Man's palm is pressed a certain way, a metal strip is drawn back. The web fluid is now free to go out the hole of the cartridge and through the nozzle. The webshooter stretches so that Spidey can slip his hand in and out of it (like one of those watch bands that you don't have to fasten and unfasten).

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


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
