


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
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












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
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
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FUNKY FACTS AND FREAKY FABLES, FROM THE FICKLE FINGER OF FORBUSH!

First, there were many typical flaws. You know the type—just like the one on page 16, panel 2, in which Spidey says, "If only she hadn't gone for that milk just then." But, Spidey never knew that she went to the store to get milk. This sort of thing, however, I can overlook, since comic-books are filled with them. But, looking at the rest of the story—I

More than nine full pages showed Spidey rehashing his problems. This, to me, was a total waste, as it probably was to many of your readers. The remaining pages were done well, considering the major flow in the plot—this fault being Aunt/May's not dying. For Aunt May not b die, with her weak heart, was, under the circumstances, terribly unrealistic. I think that "ugh!" would be an adequate word to describe my feelings towards this bit of unrealism.

Aunt May has been around now for 94 full issues of Spidey, and from the very beginning she has been unhealthy...and yet, she still hasn't died. I, for one, would think if truly fitting if she died of natural causes in her sleep. I think that a death of this sort would be very realistic and, above all, a happy change from the terribly dramatic deaths that constantly occur in comic books. After all, everyone must die sooner or later...and she should have died five years ago! Quite frankly, I'm beginning to believe that she's immortal!

Getting back to issue "94, I was quite unhappy about the artwork. I'veneverbeen an admirer of Mr. Romita's work [I've been what you would call a member of the tolerable minority]. Sal Buscema, however, is entirely unsuited to ink John Romita's pencils. Buscema's use of blacks, coupled with the dismal coloring job, made the mag look quite muddy.

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Whoever it was that said lightning never strikes the same place twice was a fool. It is a well-known fact that in nature, two different bolts of lightening often strike the same spot. It is also known, now, that in the make-believe world of Marvel Comics, it is possible for the same ground to be struck twice, over a period of years, by the same single bolt. Just look here, you'll see

Does anyone out there remember an old strip called SPIDER-MAN? Let me tell you about it, if I may. As I recall it first hit he stands eight or nine years ago, and soon developed into a tremendously popular comic. A very original strip, it mixed (with considerable success) genuinely amusing humor, Ively fluid action scenes (compliments of one Steve Dilko, who now, for some reason, seems a lot more talented than he did then) and in-depth character development and relationship. At the time, compared to the pantheon of paper-thin characters presented to the comic-bool audience, Spider-Man looked pretty good. In fact, he was pretty good.

Because Spider-Man's gimmick, you see, was problems. Original, because no other super-heroes had problems. But more than that, Spider-Man's aimmick managed to be more than just new, and even more than just a aimmick. What it holled down to if you can believe it, was that Spider-Man's gimmick, his problems, made him just like us. That's right. He was Marvel's Everyman. the guy off the street. Sure, All comics fans wondered what it would be like to be Captain Marvel or Superman; well, here is what it would be like: Spider-Man showed us. And he not only showed us what it would be like to be super-human, but also, to our profound astonishment, he pointed out that being superhuman could be lousy. It had its drawbacks. Newspaper publishers hounded you, mobs jeered at you, villains beat the hell out of you, and the pay was intolerable, if it existed at all, And worse, your powers gave you delusions of granduer: you felt that you could do anything: stop crimes, save lives, help people. This was bad, because it brought about the inevitable discovery that your physical prowess was limited by your ability to figure out how to use it. Your human fallibility tripped you up, and now since you were a superman, on a higher plane than you used to be, you fell further and harder when you tripped.

Yes, despite the exotic, fantastic nature of the Spider-Man strip, it carried in it a germ of truth. It was good. Take a look for yourself.

Remember Betty Brant? She was Spider-Man's original lead. Back in those days, the female lead was usually an obnoxious scatterbrain who spent all her time trying to discover the hero's secret identity. But Betty was different, the first of a new breed la breed which, unfortunately, has suffered a population explosion since then). She was in love with Peter Parker, the quietspoken honor student, and she detested the violent, swaggering Spider-Man (and, realistically, she never suspected that the two were one and the same). This conflict between Peter, Betty, and S-M was symbolic of the whole strip; Peter desperately attempting to live a normal life beneath the shadow of his other identity. There were problems, but ones that flowed logically from the interplay of personalities previously established. We know that Betty hates violence before she hates Spider-Man. When her brother is killed (violently, because of his human weakness, greed) she lays the blame at Spider-Man's door, S-M became the target of all her vitriolic pacifism. Peter, confused and horrified at being loved and loathed by the same girl, is immobilized and baffled. Eventually in his bewilderment at the whole affair, he drives Belly from him and from the strip. When she returns, months later, she is like a stranger to him. Problems,

But, like real life problems, these troubles, this whole situation, evolved from human causes: Bethy's fear of violence, her brother's greed, Spider-Man's commitment to forcibly conquering crime, Peter's inability to cope with a complex situation, The cirses is resolved in a negative way when Betty leaves Peter, on action that hits him like a bolt of lightning.

That was 1965. Now, in 1970, lightning, the same bolt of lightning, strikes again, Look. . . .

Captain George Stacy, saving a child's life, is killed. His daughter, Gwen blames Spider-Man for the old man's death. Peter, in love with Gwen, doesn't know how to reconcile her hate for

S-M and her affection for him (Peter). And? And so Gwen liter-

Bang. The lightning bolt has hit again. For five years, since the dropping of Betty and the introduction of Gwen, we have been travelling in a 'collossal circle, heading in a straight line away from one crisis, yet, by an equally straight line, racing back towared that crisis. Congratulations, Mr. Lee. For what it's worth, you have created the world's first cyclical comic book. We are back where we started five years ago. Nothing has been accomplished.

Indeed, if anything, this new-old plot twist has had a detrimental effect. You see, the first time you gave us this story line, with Betty, the characters were clearly drawn. Rather than the characters reacting to external problems, the problems rose from the characters. All this has changed.

Spider-Man's new world is one in which nothing and no one make any sense. Bricks fall on Captain Stacy for no reason. Gwen pins blame on S-M for no reason. You have never established that the girl harbored any hostility for the character. It is too sudden, her hate; too arbitrary a hing to be rotional. He has, after all, lived through this situation before. If he says nothing to Gwen, if he makes no moves, he will lose her. So what does he do? Plays Hamlet, procrastinates. When he moves finally, he is too late. The dope, You expect us to have any respect for you, after the way you dish out this mangled rehashing of a fine old plot?

Apparently, the once-original aimmick has grown to be a Frankenstein's monster. Problems have become an end in themself It no longer is peressary for them to stem from discernable causes; it no longer matters that the problems have become meaningless and wholly unavoidable: just as long as Peter is miserable, you sell magazines. What we are left with is the one thing that the strip never was: soap-opera. Soap-opera, and an idiot here. He wonders what to do next all the time. He threatens, annually, to quit the super-hero racket. But he finds, inevnably, endlessly, that he cannot quit, that he has a moral responsibility to himself to continue being Spider-Man. He discovers this over and over, a couple times a year, Like his cyclical love life, this soul-searching gets the least bit wearisome after a while. The gimmick has broken down. Just "problems" are no longer enough. You need new problems, new challenges. You must either switch over to a straight-actionmystery-Batman type of thing, or develop new ideas for your old format.

Because one thing is sure: you can't possibly go on like you are now and expect to be called a quality comic book. Spider-Man has been imprisoned in the same rut, the same basic story line, for years. He needs to get out. His strength was always in change and innovation. If you insist upon playing up the out-of-costume-hero as much as his in-costume alter ego, then you must give the out-of-costume-hero something to do. You cannot keep on circling the same plot; and yet, that is exactly what you will do as long as Spider-Man is single, a college student, and in lave with a girl (any girl-you can change the name and face ad infinitum, but you will always wind up with the same old result). You have taken that format as far as it will go. Now either it will change or your audience will change. I for one have no intention of reading stories that, like the Worm Ourobourous, inevitably circle back on themselves, reaching the same old points of crisis as before. Who wants the same bolt of lightning visited upon them every few years?
