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
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

AMAZING SPIDER-MAN #222 was certainly a flashy item, wasn't it? The cover was delightful, what with the logo and so on being caught up in Speed Demon's wind. (Too bad it didn't sweep the UPC computer symbol out of the lower left-hand corner and off the page!)

Spider-Man's battle with the Speed Demon was interesting, though it tended toward the cuteness which has been too apparent in this title of late. For me, the highlight of the issue was the interplay of Jonah Jameson, and - what's more - Spider-Man's concern for his image. The public image of the costumed adventurer is often glossed over, but it is still important. It serves to either stroke the ego of the hero, or to smooth his path with the public and engender their co-operation (or both!). In Spider-Man's case, comments about his image are usually limited to his bemoaning what a rough break he gets. Here, he actually did something about it... or tried to.

Come to think of it. Peter should have a

good idea of what public relations is all about, as he's been connected with the media since his high school days. Why doesn't he mount a campaign to improve his stand-ing with the public? Sure, it would take a lot of time and effort away from being Spider-Man, but it could pay off later in increased ease of operations... not to mention a cheerier outlook on life by Mr. P. Parker.
