Fantastic! The story, art, lettering, and everything else were great! ASM has reached heights never before achieved, in my humble opinion. From Speed Demon and the Red Ghost to the Foolkiller, the Black Cat. and Juggernaut, we've seen some great villains, all expertly portrayed to the benefit of superb issues.

Back to issue #230. To begin with, the art was incredible. I have loved every cover J.R. has drawn for this comic, my favorites being issue #225 and this newest masterpiece. The contrast between Spider-Man and the Juggernaut was beautiful.

The artwork between the covers was also fantastic. I think that John Romita Jr. draws Spider-Man's musculature with as much skill and grace as anyone at Marvel today. Page seven, panel 1 and page ten, panel 6 (shades of John Byrne), as well as all of page 16, were especially well done. I hope J.R. keeps that fantastic artwork coming. In my book, he's one of the best!

One nice touch to the art: Spider-Man's costume being ripped on page 18. Another nice touch: Pete's badly bruised face after his confrontation with Juggernaut. This served to remind us of just how much punishment Spider-Man took. Much too often, a hero is depicted as coming through a long, fierce battle virtually unscathed. Pete's "battle wounds" added believability to the tale Good job

Now for the story! Again, I must commend you. Only Spider-Man could get stuck fighting an "unbeatable foe," and only Spider-Man could (sort of) win such a battle!

There were also many little things that contributed to my enjoyment of the comic: Pete's anger over what he believed to be his failure in protecting Madame Web ... Spider-Man's strength and agility during the fight... Spider-Man running out of web-fluid midway through the battle (typical Parker luck!)... Spider-Man's reaction to the threat of the angry truck driver (about time!). But the best part of all was the scene in which Pete got the better of Lance Bannon, without even trying. Bannon reminds me of a swarm of gnats on a hot summer day - he's extremely annoying, but there's not much you can do to get rid of him!

Especially impressive were Spider-Man's thoughts as he took that horrendous beating on page 17. Despite the incredible pain he must have been experiencing, Spider-Man held on to the Juggernaut because of his responsibility to Madame Web and the common man. Mr. Stern has delved into Pete's character and turned it inside out. Those four little panels show how much Peter has grown. They also show something that hasn't been depicted with such fervency since Spider-Man's battle with D'Spayre: Spider-Man is a hero... and a darn good one.

Keep up the good work, people. Your efforts are (obviously) appreciated. I am deeply impressed with the quality of this comic, and with all Marvel Comics in general. (And I have six subscriptions to prove
