





























GREETINGS





I haven't read a comic book in nearly six years, and I suddenly had an overwhelming urge to buy a copy of the AMAZING SPIDER-MAN to find out what's been happening since I departed. I picked up a copy of issue #236 and, being in a comic shop, I also purchased #234 and #235 at the same

While none of the supporting cast members seemed familiar to me, aside from Robbie and J.J.J., I seem to just barely remember Tarantula from the old Jackal Clone issues. Am I correct?

The way Tarantula died in issue #236. after turning into a monstrous spider-creature, really struck me hard. That scene was exceptionally well done. Villains, after all, are people, too.
