Dear Spider-Gang,

I waited patientity for the inevitable controversy over Spider-Man's new costume before tossing my thoughts into what has proven to be a lively nation-wide debate. My position on the matter may be unique: I don't care which outfit Peter Parker dons to fight evil, because in the long run, it doesn't really matter.

In issue #100, when America was stunned by a six-armed Spider-Man, you asked on the cover: "The Spider or The Man?" That question has been asked many times over, in one form or another, and the answer has consistently been "the man." Peter is a man, and his powers are, if anything, an extension of his humanity. Whether he is in street clothes or in full spidergarb, his personality remains consistent. He cares, he loves, he is vuinerable, and he can be hurt in ways others than a beating from some super-foe. Witness the tragedies of Uncle Ben, Captain Stacy, and Gwen Stacy. Costume or not, Peter suffers. Yes, he always changes after these sad events, but always for the better. He matures as a person, which naturally adds dimension to his super counterpart. In other words, it's the man who makes the hero, not the costume

Whether Peter wears his classic blue and red costume, or the chic new black version, he is still Peter. Hence, Spider-Man is still Spide Man. But since he is still Peter, he can never become "the spider." When Peter grew those extra arms after trying to rid himself of his powers he learned a valuable lesson about his own humanity. Perhaps life was difficult as a Spider-Man, but it was nightmarish as a "Man-Spider." Peter relates too much to his human side to ever sacrifice a portion of it. And he does recognize his "gift" and accepts it, albeit reluctantly. Though he may sometimes expre dismay at his lot in life, he would never truly give it up. He would feel incomplete. Conversely, he would never allow the spider to take over either, which is why I believe his relationship with the Black Cat is doomed. She loves the spider, not the man. Peter wants both sides of himself to be loved equally, otherwise any relationship would be incomplete. Mary Jane, on the other hand, knows Peter's secret, and accepts it. And, as was seen, when Peter learned that the costume was slowly taking over, he unhesistantly dumped it. He refused to los humanity to an alien life-form which would have turned him into "the spider" forever. And what happened to Peter right after he got rid of the new outfit? He is made the brunt of a delightful practical joke by Johnny Storm, his closest super-friend! A wonderful re-affirmation of Peter "the man."

Perhaps these thoughts on the matter of Spider-Man, Peter, and the new costume seem a bit random, but it could not be helped. I grew up with Spider-Man, and he was (and still is) a part of my life.
