

Dear Marvel

Spider-Man #270 was awesomely great The fight scenes were not only entertaining, but were logical and realistic. Spider-Man's struggle for survival, combined with the fact that despite his growing fears and fatigue, Spider-Man kept on coming. Not only did that take tremendous amounts of courage and will-power, it was extremely realistic. Furthermore, it was logical way Spider-Man used his acrobatic "spider" agility and reflexes to confuse Firelord. In addition, I simply LOVED the way Spider-Man used his "danger" or "spider" sense to enable him to anticipate Firelord's every attack.

As in normal humans, Spider-Man's adrenal medulla probably secreted large amounts of epenephrine in his stressful and fearful state at the time of the batle, which stimulated the heartbeat rate, raised blood levels, and inhibited sensations of fatigue (the "fight or flight" hormone) that heightened Spider-Man's physical abilities, thus giving him a great advantage

It was fitting that AMAZING SPIDER-MAN #271 was a nostalgic look back at Crusher Hogan, because the art team of Frenz and Rubenstein evokes a feeling of the "good of days" in Spider-Man's life when things were simpler, even though they really have not been as bad as Peter seems to think they have, until recentiv.

Before the last year or so, the tales in the assorted Spider-Books have kept the life of the hero at a status quo. Lately, though, with the addition of an editor who does not like Peter's photographs (with good reason, he never took much formal training in photographer), the death of Jean DeWolff. Mary Jane's discovery of his identity and even the sun-bathers on his roof. Peter Parker has often had good reason to consider the spider's bite as a curse instead of a blessing.

Issue #271 is a good example of this new trend, as again he finds that superheroics call him away from keeping his promises to Aunt May. While Manslaughter certainly was not a great threat to Spider-Man, the complete futility of his situation: rescuing Hogan and the fighter while Nathan was being attacked by loan sharks, was expressed well. The closing scene with Aunt May ended as many have in the past. but I have one complaint: Peter needs to stop letting Aunt May dictate their relationship. Whenever he feels that he has let her down, he listens to her complaints and then backs away. For once, I would like to see him stop her from closing the door on his face (and their relationship) and go inside and talk with her.

Finally, there is one more point that I would like to make. In the Marvel Universe most of the biggest solitary heroes are single. Spider-Man, Daredevil, Thor, and Cap all have had relationships that could have but for various reasons (death, the danger of being linked to a superhero, etc.) have not led to the altar. Now that Mary Jane knows that Pete is Spider-Man, there is no reason why they couldn't marry if their relationship called for it. While this certainly would be a major change in the life of Marvel's "star attraction," it would be a very welcome one.

Thanks for a very good comic, another of those trends you seem to be starting behind the scenes of Marvel's Spider-Books!
