Second: the shark in the Midtown Tunnel and the amazing "Spider-Blimp." These are perhaps the two most original Infernorelated menaces I've seen yet. Finally, the last infernal "Inferno" crossover for THE AMAZING SPIDER-MAN has arrived, now we can get on with the series again. It may seem like the comic reading public is mutant crazy, at least those who read Marvel, but a large segment of us could care less about all those X-groups. I know that if something like "Inferno" happened it would have to involve all New York-based heroes, but couldn't Peter have been out promoting his book, or on assignment for NOW Magazine?

Actually, AMAZING fared better than the other Spider-titles. #311 gave us the return of Mysterio in an imaginative fashion. #312 had the climax to the Hobgoblin-Green Goblin battle. #313 was a good way to have the Lizard return. I hope this isn't the last of him. Also, David wrote less demons into his tales than Gerry Conway did. This allowed him to keep stories more in the Spidey-style he does so

David also showed family concerns. There were revealing parallels between one situation involving Peter and his Aunt May along with Mary Jane and her cousin Kristy and the other involving

the Connors. When will we see Kristy's parents?

Finally, I really enjoyed the scenes with the Spider-Man float. It was wonderful comic relief, and another one of those touches Marvel uses to make their comics seem more real. The best line of the whole exchange was when Spidey proclaimed, "The guy's eyes were all wrong, anyway . . .!" As any observant Spider-reader has noticed, Todd draws Spidey's eyes differently than most Spiderartists have. It was interesting to see him try it the other way.

Other than that, it was pretty good, for a Lizard story. After all, there's only so many variations on the old "squirt-the-cure-into-the-Lizard's-mouth" plot. The art was fantastic, as usual. Todd draws one mean Lizard! I especially liked that grin that Liz seemed to have whenever he closed his mouth.

Next issue: Jonathon Caesar seeks revenge? Yawwn. What's he gonna do, evict them? Occocoo. Sounds ominous.

I can't think of anything else to say for this month except that I hope the current creative team stays on this title for a good long time. Other than the breakneck pace, I'm enjoying myself immensely. Keep up the great work and continued success!
