Larsen's style is paradoxical in that is constantly fluctuating from a look that borders on the absurd, to a look that is wonderfully realistic and visually appealing. Pages 9 and 11 are a good example of this change in the artwork. This alternating style effectively integrates all the world's complexities and absurdities into the comic, making the end product rather interesting!

Similarly, there is a noticeable difference between the portrayal of scenes that take place during the day and those that take place during the night. The night ones are much more effective because they make use of devices like shadows and lights and create a mood. If the same sort of thing could be worked on for the day scenes, the comic would have even better than it already is!

Thanks for keeping Spider-Man's character consistent! His aversion to senseless killing and his enduring wit are all part of his charm!

You guys deserve plenty of compliments for your great meddling in Peter Parker's life, but you can hear those from most of your other readers. So what am I here for? I'm going straight for a No-Prize, of course.

ASM #330, the teaser interlude on page 15, panel 3: One of the Guardsmen yells an order to "Shut off the sonic barrier guarding the door!" before entering Eddie Brock's cell: This is an apparently pointless breach of security, since only the allien is sensitive to the sonics and others can pass through the sonic wall unaffected (ASM #315, page 1, panels 4-5). Why bother canceling the sonics when that caused Venom's earlier plan to escape to succeed?

The answer: Unlike the pre-Armor Wars suits, the recently unveiled (AVENGERS SPOTLIGHT #29) Guardsmen Mark II suits now employed at the Vault can be effected by the sonics. My guess is that the barrier would disrupt the suits' short-range broadcast power reception. (When Tony Stark designed the Mark II, he failed to include an internal power source so that the suits could never be used outside of the Vault). According to Iron Man, the suits' juice comes from power strips built into the Vault itself, but I doubt the cells themselves are equipped with these.

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
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
