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
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




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












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### (1917 - 1994)

Jack Kirby, one of the founding fathers of Marvel, passed away in February of this year. This week, we present the second in our month-long series of tributes to the man who co-created the FAN-TASTIC FOUR, the HULK, the X-MEN, CAPTAIN AMERICA, and thousands

more. Here's what some of Kirby's fellow pros had to say in tribute to the King ...

Joe Sinnott: Kirby was to comics what Babe Ruth was to baseball and Einstein was to science

Tom DeFalco: Jack Kirby gave visual form to the fantasies of an entire generation, and his influence will be felt as long as comic books endure

John Buscema: He reinvented super-hero comics. If it wasn't for Kirby, I wouldn't be in this business. I had gotten out of comics for a while - I was doing advertising art - and when I got back into it in '66, I had no concept of how comics were supposed to look. Kirby's work was a jumping-on point for me, even though our styles look nothing alike. saw what he did, and I took it from there. Kirby had no peer in this business. He's a man who deserves everyone's respect.

Marie Severin: I am grateful to Jack Kirby for his tremendous influence in the revitalization of the comic book industry. Stan was quite right in calling him "King

Curt Swan: I would say that Kirby

was probably the premiere innovator of stories and characters

Sal Buscema: I doubt if there is an individual working in comics today that hasn't been influenced by Jack Kirby. Anyone that says they haven't been is stretching the truth, to put it mildly. The only regret I have is that I never had the pleasure of meeting and working with him. I've been in the business for 25 years, and the greatest comic book illustrator of all time, I never got to meet. Nobody has contributed as much to the business of comic book illustration and storytelling as Jack Kirby. He's the best. He's the one against which all others are measured.

Gene Colan: We all have been influenced highly by his approach to comics, by his power and force. There isn't a soul in this business that hasn't imitated him to some extent. Kirby's work gave me a springboard to begin my career. Even as a youngster, I was highly taken with his art in the forties on Newsboy Legion and Boy Commandos. I used to emulate his style - I studied it and copied it. I came into this business not knowing a thing about comics. I went up to National (DC) at the age of thirteen, looking for work, and the art director brought out some pages by Kirby to show me how it's supposed to be done. Kirby had a very unique style you could spot it a mile away. It's really in a class by itself. Every one of us has a little bit of Kirby in him. You see his influence everywhere you look. He left behind quite a bit for us to remember.

Don Heck: Jack's legacy of stories and characters to the world is greater than that of anvone I've ever known.

I have been an avid Spider-Man reader since the sixties (I'm well into my thirties by now and still enjoy the character). I've just finished reading ASM #384, and am on tenterhooks for the next issue.

However, there is something I'd like to point out. I am a clinical child psychologist who has been working in a unit for emotionally disturbed children for a good number of years now. Susie's mother in ASM 4384 stated that Susie was a "vegetable" – a term usually reserved by lay people for brain-damaged or mentally handicapped people. Presumably Susie's mother (and not the writer, David Michelinie) has got this wrong! Susie's silence is a result of emotional trauma, not brain damage or mental retardation.
