I have been reading Spider-Man for over a decade, and I enjoyed his exploits until the clone saga. Aunt May's death, the murder of Doctor Octopus, and the pathetic return of Norman Osborn, It eventually became more difficult to read the books because the continuity became convoluted, and the repetitive story arcs made Spidey's world dull and tiresome. However, after reading the first three issues of the revamped AMAZING SPI-DER-MAN. I must admit that it seems your staff is gradually cleaning up the mess it created over the past few years. The Spider-Man universe seems less stale, and has a promising future with the presence of Howard Mackie and John Byrne to restore its once crumbling foundation.

First of all. Mackie seems focused on revitalizing the humor and excitement of the character. 

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


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
