


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

To the Editors of Spider-Man:

When I started collecting, Peter Parker was enjoying his "golden age." Despite his guilt over the death of Uncle Ben, Peter was never a depressing or moody character. He was a survivor, in spirit more than anything. He had bad luck, but he shrugged it off, and he had good luck, too. There was top talent on the titles then, such as Tom DeFalco, Peter David, Rich Buckler, a not-sp-wooden Ron Frenz, Kyle Baker, Josef Rubenstein and Bob McLeod. There was a lot of creative energy, and the plot and characters were not static. Peter Parker was still Peter Parker, but he was a little older, a little more mature. He grew, but he wasn't "old.

The current de-aging of Peter Parker and complete disrespect for the history of this era have really put me off. In an attempt to return Peter Parker to what he once was, the character has become someone I don't recognize at all. There are comics that I think are very vital to this character - comics that every creator that works on the book should be required to read One of these is Amazing SPIDER-MAN #259, which deepened the relationship between Peter and Mary Jane, and is the first time in the series that a supporting character became as three-dimensional as the star. I remember M.I pondering to herself what role she should play in the life of a professional super hero. She was still Mary Jane, but now we understood her; there was a reason why she was the way she

was and she too grew from it.

And then she was used merely for eye candy. No one knew what to do with her afte they got married. The same relationship strains were used over and over, and she got annoying. But anyone who has been in a successful relationship knows that life doesn't stop being

interesting at that point.

Look, Gwen's dead. Harry Osborn is dead. Peter grew up. But Mary Jane connects him to the history that we all love. So do Aunt May, Betty and J. Jonah Jameson — but they've all grown as well (read WEB OF SPIDER-MAN #13). The same stories do not need to be told over and over again. The originals were more, well, original. Don't get rid of Mary Jane, and don't keep her in Gwen Stacy's shadow. Don't discount the bond of their relationship. It's what brought me into this book, and it's what I've been holding out for by sticking around. If nothing else, she is truly his best friend.




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
