Mamoon's dilemma has more to do with denying the unlimited "chick-magnet" potential, but the real problem lies in duty to society/community vs. duty to spouse/family. And I imagine every Spidey writer has felt the looming presence of this 300-pound gorilla since "The Wedding" lo

those many years ago. Most of us, I imagine, read Spider-Man for the very same reasons he was created: he's an engaging, unusual, charismatic costumed crime-fighter whose non-super hero life is as imperfect and mundane as anyone else's. From the start, we've been deeply involved in his civilian struggles, and that surely is why we've always cared so much about him. Not only is it his rather abstract "struggle against evil for the good of mankind" that we admire, but also his ability to fight while suffering from the flu. wearing an itchy costume, trying to keep his friends from making life-altering mistakes, avoiding unpleasant neighbors/bosses/old girlfriends, keeping appointments while unavoidably delayed - all things which we can deeply relate to on a personal level. And, of course, we want Peter to succeed in both arenas. And, by marrying MJ, he really did succeed in the personal arena.

For writers of Spider-Man there has emerged an unsolvable dilemma. We, the readers, want several things: (1) We want Spidey, the Super Hero, (2) We will only accept Peter Parker as Spidey, and (3) We want Peter to be a great, loving, responsible husband and role model.

I certainly wouldn't know what to do with these parameters if I were writing the book. As a fan, I myself want to see all of, this work out somehow, but I can't begin to guess how it could be done and still remain true to the characters and/or make dramatic sense. Peters greatest power has become the ability to shape an entire human being — and that's now where his responsibility.

Okay, this has turned into a hugely long letter, and if you do read this far, you have my undying gratitude.

Tom, you've crystallized the debate over what path Peter Parker's life should travel — that of the down-on-his-luck bachelor, or that of the responsible family man. Some readers believe the former, some believe the latter. Only one group could get their wish.

It all boils down to a decision made by Mary Jane. Returned to her husband after a period of captivity and self-reflection. MJ has come to the conclusion that she can't fit Peter back into her life as easily as many of us had hoped. Does thils make her a flawed character? Possibly. Does this make her a real character? Definitely. The pathos is that MJ really does love Peter, but doesn't know how to live with him — an unfortunate but all-too-real dynamic of life that more than a few readers related to.

Just remember, Peter and Mary Jane's current separation is an outgrowth of a choice made by Mary Jane – not Peter. It is a choice that Peter must come to terms with. What MJ's decision signals for the ultimate fate of the couple remains to be seen. Mary Jane has walked off into the sunset. The question is, is she gone for nond?

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
