I have, literally, just finished reading issue 574, and I feel compelled to write in for the very first time. I've been reading Spider-Man comics since I got my first subscription as a birthday present in the late-70s, and I've never understood better why I love the Web-Head than I do after reading this single story.

It's funny, I already had enormous respect for those who put the good of their country before even their own lives, but I hadn't made the connection between that and what I've learned from reading Spider-Man, though I see now that they have always been much the same thing.

The reason I'm writing for the first time in 30-odd years is to say: thank you.

Thank you, the ones who've gone before you, and the ones who will come after, for believing that it \*is\* important to do the right things for the right reasons, and that it gets more important as it gets harder to do them.

Thank you for this moving display of support for our troops. I especially admire the fact that you refused to dilute that support by commenting on the war itself. I doubt there is \*anyone\* in the country who doesn't have an opinion of the war, but by not touching that point you've made your support of our boys and girls over there so much stronger.

I just finished reading Amazing Spider-Man #574, and I wanted to thank you for your story. I think I knew what had happened to Flash as soon as I saw the words "Landstuhl Regional Medical Center," and I almost had to put the book down right there.

I decided to keep going though, and I was very impressed with the realism of the story. I was thinking to myself, these guys got it right for once, meaning, a realistic interpretation of being in combat, and doing anything for your fellow Soldier. I knew there had to be more to it, and sure enough I saw a real American Hero smiling at me from the Letters Page. We wish Jeff Guerin the best, and pray for his speedy recovery.

I can empathize with Jeff, and with Flash Thompson. I grew up reading all the comics my meager allowance would afford, and I would have done anything to have the ability to help people like Spider-Man does. After I graduated high school, I got out of comics for a little while. It wasn't until I was at Walter Reed Army Medical Center that I found myself picking them up again. When you're in a hospital bed for awhile, you obviously have a lot of free time.

This story just hit so close to home for me, because I woke up just like Flash did in Germany. I lost my right leg above the knee and my left leg below the knee to an IED in 2004, while serving with the Combined Joint Special Operations Task Force in Iraq. I just wanted to think you for telling our story and thank you to Jeff for his input, and courage to be a hero in the real world.

Some people might think Flash will be in a wheelchair for the rest of his life, I used to think that too. I have a challenge for Flash though; I stood up thirty days after I was blown up. I walked out of the hospital 4 months after that. All it took was the strength and willingness to do so. Now, I even have a set of legs I can run with.



I hope you can tell the rest of Flash's story at some point. Thank you for honoring those that have served in the War on Terror. especially those that lost their lives, and those of us that left part of us there.

That was one of the best comics I've ever read in my entire life.
